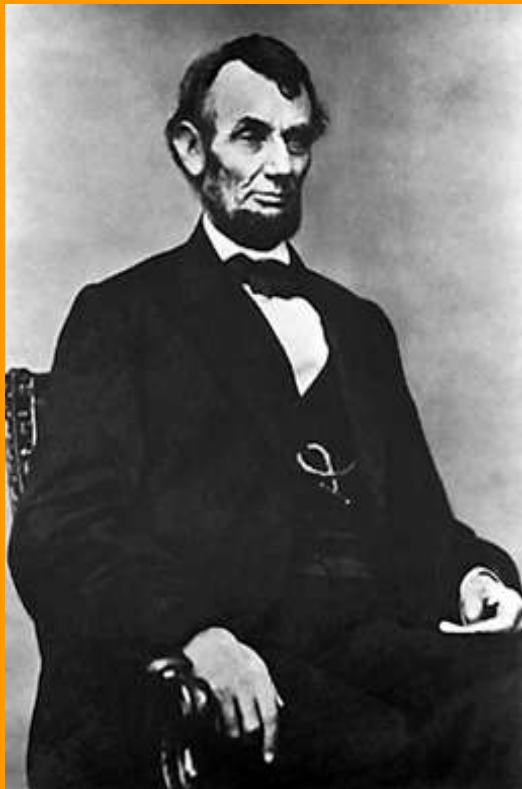

Two men fighting over a slave, the decision of keeping slavery or getting rid of it, the one on the white horse wanting to keep it.



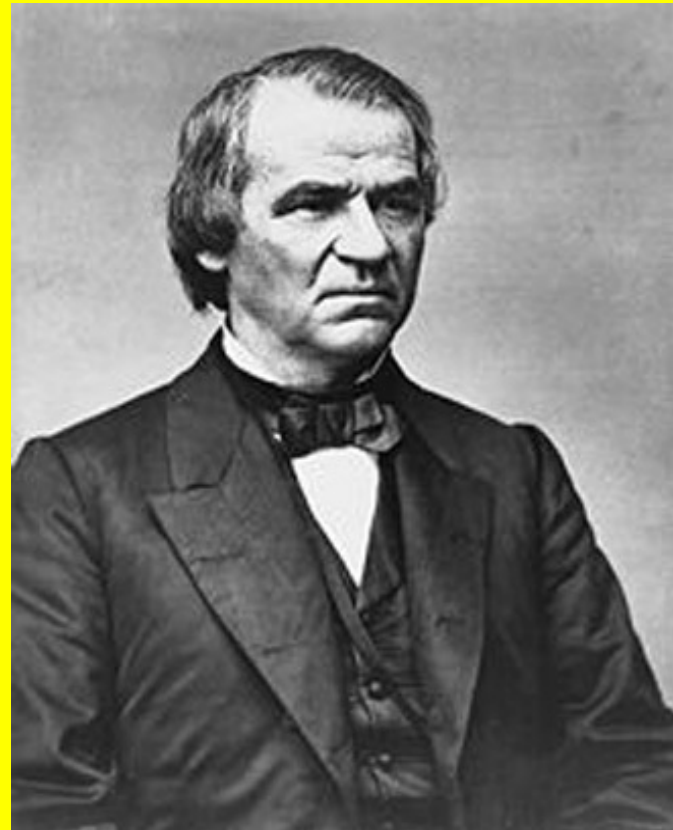
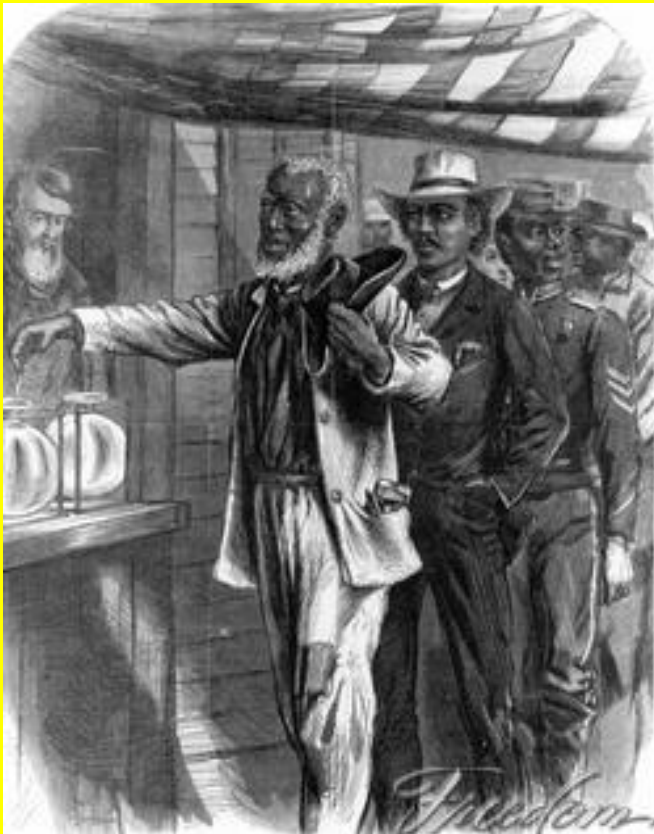
# Faces of Reconstruction

Left: Lincoln before his assassination and after becoming President. Right: A symbol for the Radical Reconstruction Act passed by Congress in 1867.



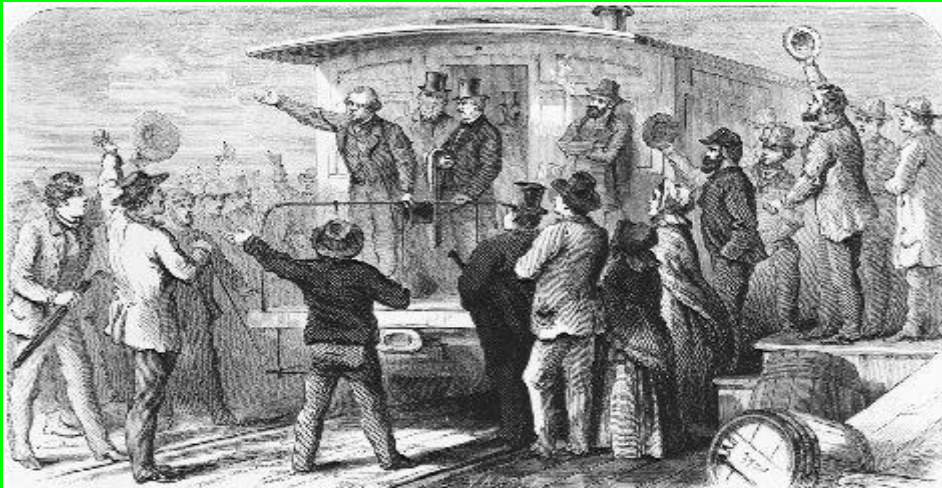
# Faces of Reconstruction

# Faces of Reconstruction

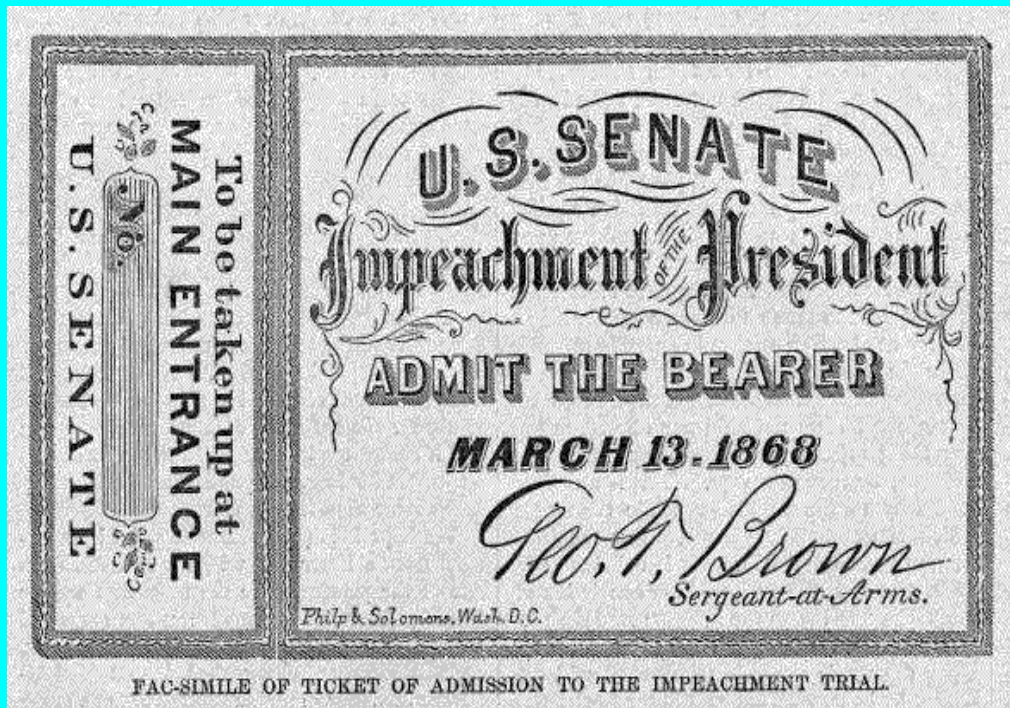

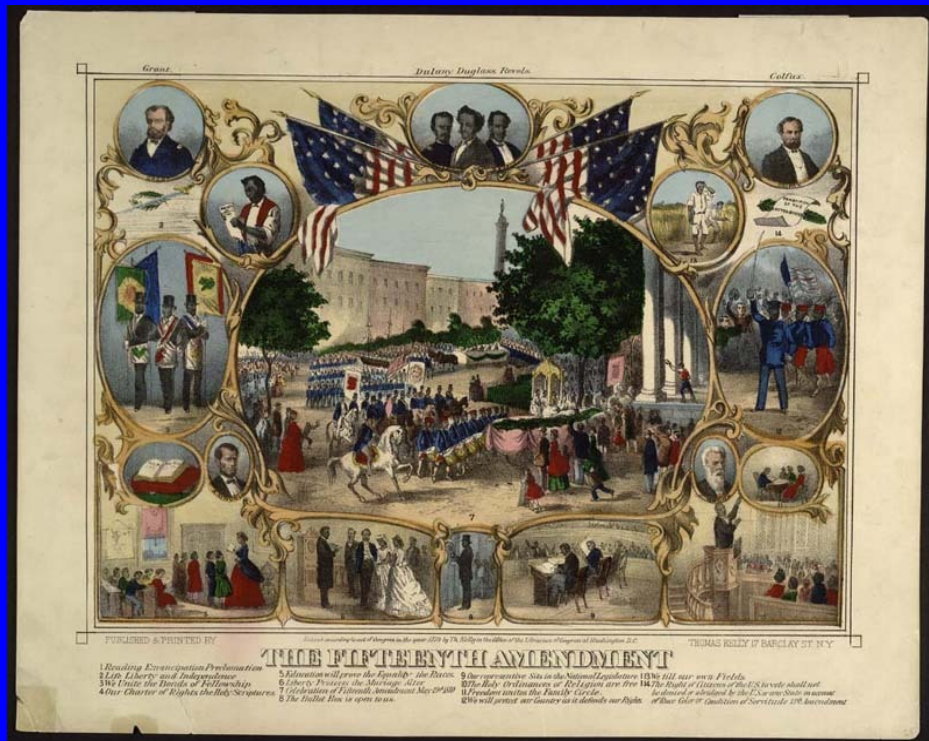
# Faces of Reconstruction

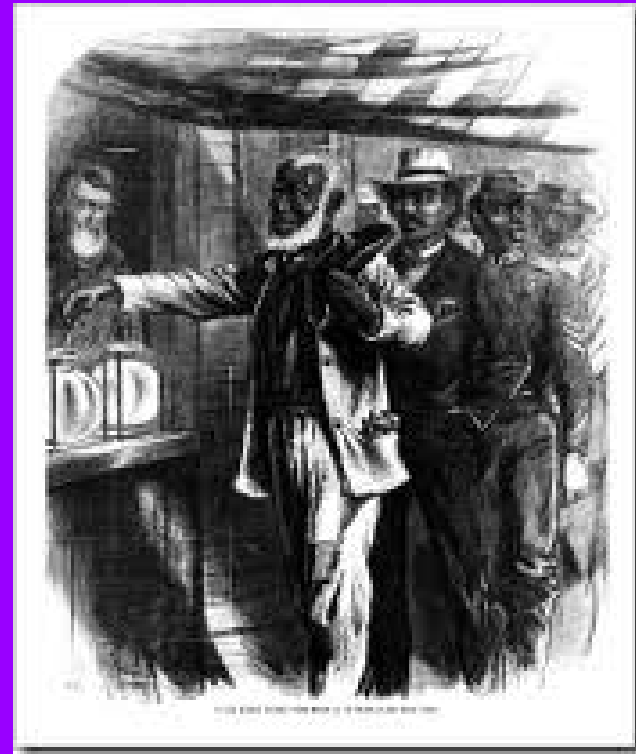
# Faces of Reconstruction
