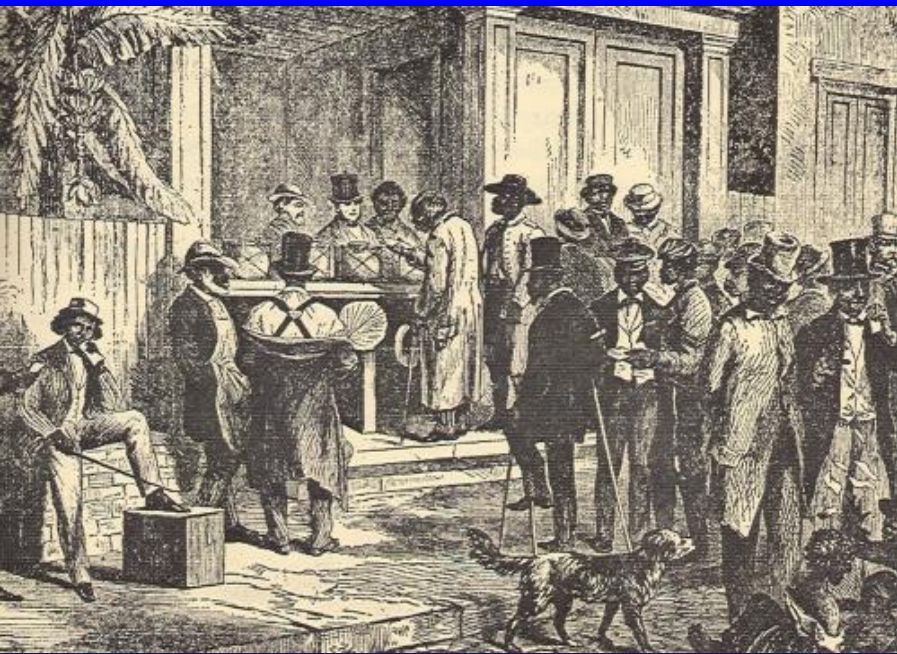
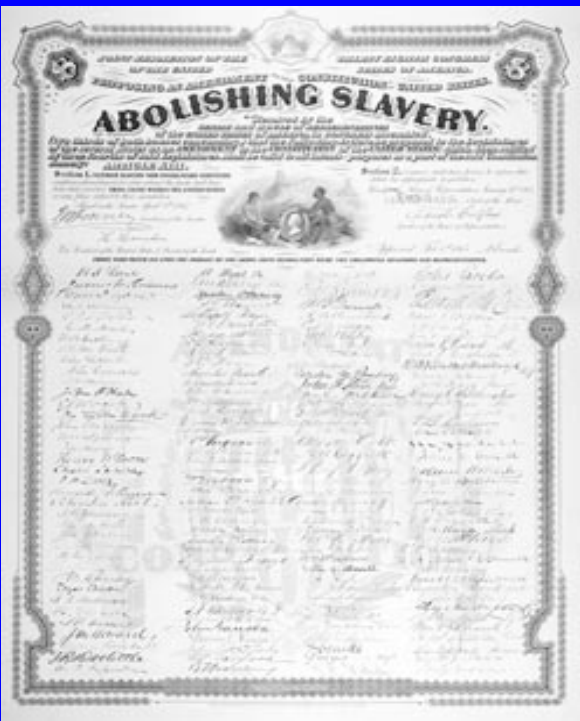


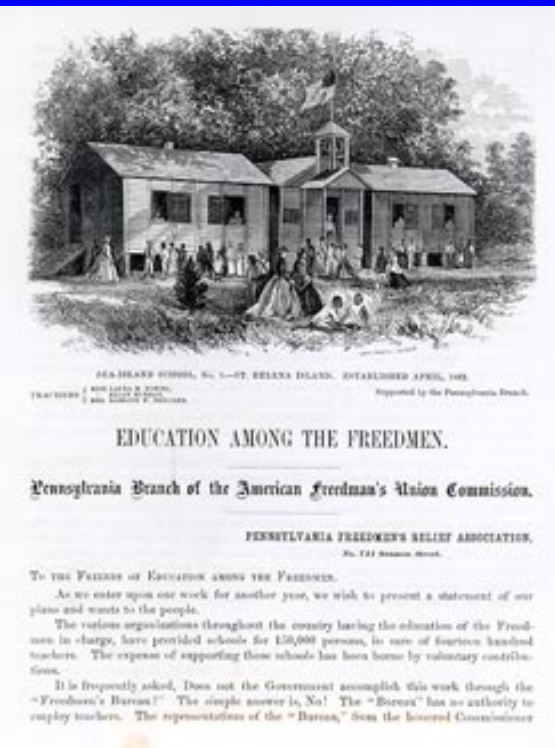
## *Faces of Reconstruction*

**Above(middle):** A Harper's Magazine cartoon alleging Ku Klux Klan and White League opposition to Reconstruction.

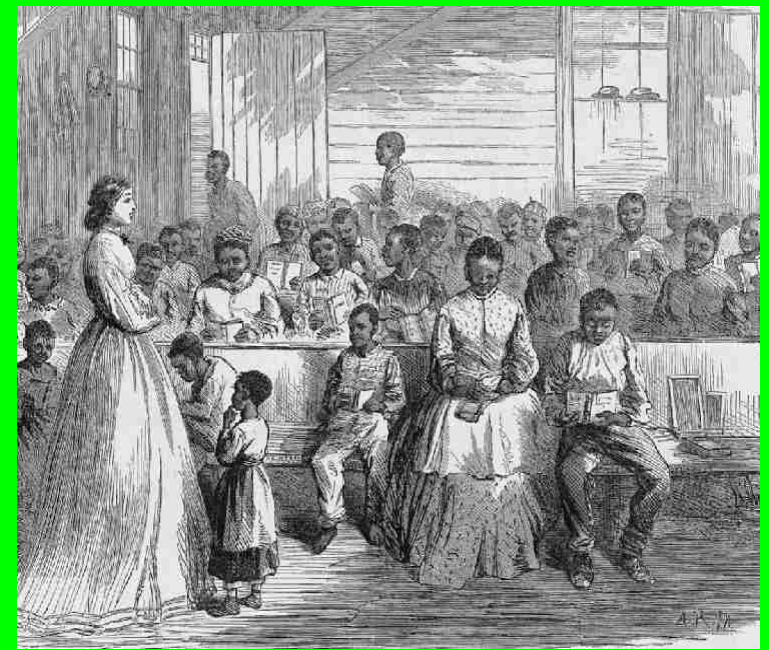

**Right:** A political cartoon of Johnson and Lincoln, 1865.





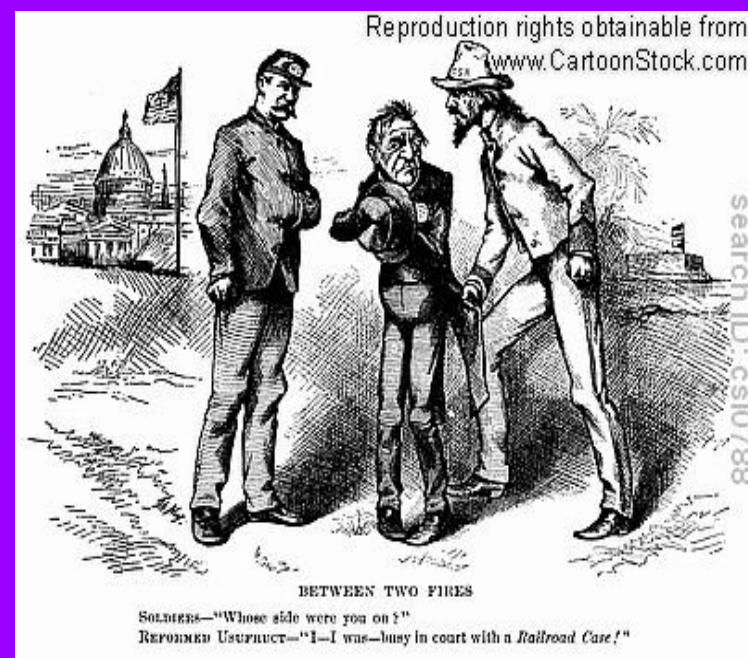


**Above:** Atlanta's railyard and roundhouse in ruins shortly after the end of the Civil War.
